MESSAGE FROM CANON MIKE

This Monday I head to Swansea to celebrate a Requiem Mass for Dr Edwin Jones, the first Headmaster of St Joseph's Comprehensive School, Port Talbot. It was he who placed the school on firm foundations, his work being carried on in an exemplary way by the current school leadership along with its Staff and Governors.

I last met him five years ago at a Mass in the Church of St Michael in Newport. He was sitting in the Church with his family and I was taken back to my own time at St Joseph's. Edwin was a kind and honourable man who recognized in each child their dignity and worth, each different, but without that child, the Community of the School was incomplete. I asked him why I had been chosen as Head Boy. He fought the other members of staff who said "Evans, you're not the brightest bulb on the tree" but Edwin explained that not all are called to Oxford or Cambridge but some are called to "serve, not to be served". It was he, along with Dan Williams (another teacher, who in later life became a Priest) who encouraged me to listen to the voice of the Lord: to come and follow Him.

Dr Jones knew that I was no academic, but he said I possessed gifts and talents that could be used in building up the community of believers, called to take on the responsibility of Head Boy, 'leading by example'.

One day he sent me to the newsagents to buy the Times and the Guardian and I came back with the Radio Times and the Port Talbot Guardian. Certain members of staff had great delight in belittling me!

"In the history of the school, you're the most inept Head Boy we've had....."

What came next has remained with me for over 50 years. Edwin told a story of Michaelangelo, the great Italian sculptor who went in search of a block of marble. The owner of the quarry offered him a perfect slab of marble. It was the right dimensions, shape and colour but he rejected it. In the corner Michaelangelo noticed an 'off-cut' which had been rejected by the other craftsmen, but he could see that within this 'off-cut', if he took time and effort, he could produce something of great beauty. This he did and after a number of years produced the statue which can now be found in St Peter's in Rome.... The Pieta.


I was one of many, who was recognised by Edwin as containing something of 'great value'. In the eyes of some teachers I was an 'off-cut', good for nothing only to be left in the corner of the room.

Maybe it's a coincidence, but today's Gospel is the one Dr Jones talked about when I told him I was off to 'try my vocation'. He said following Christ was not an easy road, but rewarding, "If you want to be a follower of mine, pick up your cross and follow me."

Dr Jones went on to say that Priesthood was to be there to help others carry their burdens not to impose more difficulties upon people. He, like many other people showed what vocation was about: "To serve, not to be served."

Thank you Dr Edwin Jones, for your wisdom and encouragement, for seeing in me the seeds of vocation which others failed to recognise.

The school badge had the motto of the White Monks, the Cistercians, "Laborare est Orare" To Work is to Pray, and Dr Edwin Jones' prayer life was seen through his work.




"What am I going to do? He's told them it's a nose cone for outer space ."
