MESSAGE FROM CANON MIKE

You've heard me talk about my ministry in the valleys, each story being true.

This Wednesday, the Archdiocese remembers the Parish of St Illtyd's Dowlais, the oldest Parish in the Industrial Valleys. From there, they would send a Priest to say Mass in a village called Cardiff. The first resident Parish Priest from 1830's was Michael Carroll who originally came from Co. Waterford.

Dowlais and Merthyr people in those days lived among the hills of North Glamorgan. It was the coming of large numbers of the Irish to work in the local iron works, (my Grandfather being one, coming from Donegal to Dowlais in 1890), that brought about sending the first resident Priest in 1826. In 1831, Michael Carroll was appointed to this vast area which he visited on foot, then on horseback. He was welcomed and assisted by a Mr Lewis of Rhymney. Carroll taught the poor Irish in their own native language and Mr Lewis spoke to the 'locals' in Welsh.

The parish boundaries were the whole of the Heads of the Valleys, Glynneath in the West to Brynmawr in the East, South to Pontypridd and Caerphilly.

The Priest prior to Michael Carroll was Patrick Portal who eventually left for Newport and the coast as the work was hard and as he had experienced the Merthyr Riots of 1831 he thought 'he should get out of town!'

Fr Carroll lived and worked among the poor and through family and friends sending him goods, along with potatoes and herrings, he could eke out a livelihood using the proceeds to feed himself and help his parishioners. Even though the conditions were deplorable he had a vision of building a Church. This he started but died of cholera without seeing the completion of his labours.

This is what we are remembering this week, the sacrifice of Priests and people. As it says in this weekend's Gospel

Jesus sent His Disciples to them because He felt sorry for them "as they were like sheep without a shepherd."

Fr Carroll is a hero of mine. We need men to follow in his footsteps: brave, courageous and dedicated men, willing to give their all for the sake of the Gospel. As he had no chalice or other items needed to celebrate Mass, not even a coat to keep himself warm, he was sent a chalice from Bishop Peter Baines (Prior Park, Bath), which is still used on special occasions. The chalice is made of silver, a Pre-Reformation Chalice which had been used during Penal Times, with the following inscription on its base in Latin, French and Welsh.

"The Poet Dafydd Ddu O Hiraddug, son of Gruffydd ap Meredydd had this chalice made at Paris to pray for those souls April 1st 1469AD"

Like the clergy who served here at St Patrick's and the many other Parishes I've served, I thank the Lord for their perseverance and unwavering loyalty to Christ, His Church and You, the people of God for supporting the clergy.

Well, it's time for the Family of St Patrick's to say "Thank You and Farewell" to Mary Taylor who leaves her beloved St Patrick's school after 43 years. I wrote about men who followed Michael Carroll, and priests and fellow workers with Christ, as being men of perseverance, courage and dedication. That is true vocation.

Without hesitation, Mary is a wonderful example of a committed, dedicated Catholic Teacher. She had a vocation and lived it to the very end of her teaching career.

Now the bell has rung for the end of the day. Mary, as you head out of the door, move on, and enjoy the new chapter of your life with Tommy.


